

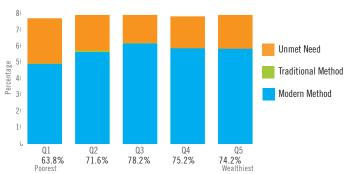

Demand Satisfied by Modern Method & Wealth Quintile

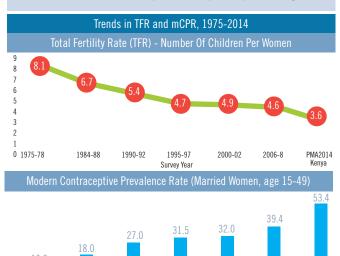


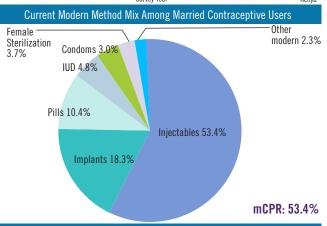

PERFORMANCE MONITORING & ACCOUNTABILITY 2020

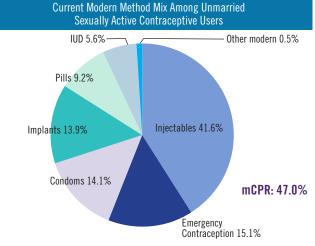
PMA2020 is a five-year project that uses innovative mobile technology to support low-cost, rapid-turnaround, nationally-representative surveys to monitor key indicators for family planning. The project is implemented by local university and research organizations in ten countries, deploying a cadre of female resident enumerators trained in mobile-assisted data collection. PMA2020/Kenya is led by the Ministry of Health in collaboration with International Centre for Reproductive Health Kenya (ICRHK), National Council for Population and Development, and Kenya National Bureau of Statistics. Overall direction and support is provided by the Bill & Melinda Gates Institute for Population and Reproductive Health at the Johns Hopkins Bloomberg School of Public Health and funded by the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

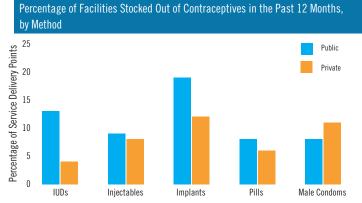

SAMPLE DESIGN

The PMA2020/Kenya survey used a two-stage cluster design with urban-rural and county as strata. A sample of 120 enumeration areas (EAs) was drawn by the Kenya National Bureau of Statistics from its master sampling frame. In each EA households and private health facilities were listed and mapped, with 42 households randomly selected. Households were surveyed and occupants enumerated. All eligible females age 15 to 49 were contacted and consented for interviews. The final sample included 4,518 households, 3,815 females and 270 health facilities. Data collection was conducted between May and July 2014.
